King's Wharf, Bermuda (Royal Naval Dockyard)

Mark Twain once said, "You can go to heaven if you want to. I'd rather go to Bermuda"; and upon arrival in Bermuda, it's easy to see why. The island paradise boasts nearly 75 miles of impeccable coastline surrounded by sparkling turguoise waters. The sophisticated British overseas territory, with art galleries, craft markets, and historic fortresses, is as rich in culture as it is in natural beauty-with a whole lot of pink.

Contrary to popular belief, Bermuda is not in the Caribbean region. Instead, it sits by its lonesome in the Atlantic Ocean, approximately 650 miles east of North Carolina and more than 800 miles north of the Bahamas. Cruise ships dock at King's Wharf, which is often referred to as the Royal Naval Dockyard or the West End. The dockyard was originally built for the British Navy in the early 19th century.

Maritime Lane runs around the far end of the dockvard, which is where to find an array of local artisans and exhibitions. Bermuda's signature arts and crafts are referred to as Bermudiana, which consists of everything from handcrafted jewelry and cedar-wood trinkets to miniature ceramic cottages and polished sharks' teeth set in 14-karat gold. Soothing watercolor paintings that recreate the bountiful natural surroundings are also extremely popular. Other souvenir favorites include Bermuda's own Black Seal Rum and, of course, a pair of Bermuda shorts.

Most roads throughout Bermuda are paved and well-maintained, but they can be narrow and busy. Climb aboard the open-air Dockvard Trolley Train to get a complete tour of the dockyard. Horse-drawn carriages are another fun way to see the dockyard and its surrounding area.

Places of Interest

1 Hamilton

The colonial town is Bermuda's international and local business center, where quaint boutiques and specialty shops abound. The charming capital is also packed with historic buildings, churches, museums, galleries, and gardens. Bermuda's original capital is now a UNESCO World Heritage Site. See the statue of Sir George Somers, one of the first colonists to settle the town. Visit historic forts. homes, and the oldest Anglican church in the Western Hemisphere.

Bermuda is not one continuous landmass, but instead a collection of 181 different islets and small islands.

The sand of the islands' world-famous pink beaches is actually a combination of crushed coral, calcium carbonate, and the shells of tiny single-celled animals called Foraminifera.

The convenient SeaExpress ferry service runs between the Royal Naval Dockyard, Hamilton, and St. George's. Tickets and schedules can be found at the Ferry Terminals or Visitors Information Centres. One-Day Passes: \$12 per adult, \$6 per child; Two-Day Passes: \$20 per adult, \$10 per child; children under five ride free.* *Prices subject to change

3 Crystal Caves
